I. Course Description

This course is intended to provide advanced skills for faculty development in a clinical research career. It involves topics not usually taught in regular courses. It focuses on career needs at the stage of development of a junior faculty member. It emphasizes the opportunities of multidisciplinary approaches to contemporary research questions.

Course Evaluation

Beginning in fall 2008 the SPH will collect student course evaluations electronically using a software system called CoursEval. The assignment of an "I" requires that a contract be initiated and completed by the student before the last day of class, and signed by both the student and instructor. If an incomplete is deemed appropriate by the instructor, the student in consultation with the instructor, will specify the time and manner in which the student will complete course requirements.
